- **8-hour** training.
- Intended for **multi-disciplinary F/SLTT Homeland Security partners**.
- Equip partners to **identify and report** behaviors of concern.
- Recognize **intervention strategies** to move individuals off a pathway to violence.

Threat Evaluation and Reporting Course (TERC)

- **24-hour** training.
- Intended for **multi-disciplinary F/SLTT Homeland Security partners**.
- Apply **Behavioral Threat Assessment and Management** best practices.
- Assist in **preventing acts of terrorism and mass violence**.
